



Autumn Overnight

Why did I believe the weather report?

It was the middle of October. The air was cool and the leaves were at their peak of color. I needed a couple of days away from the world. If I rushed a few things and put the rest off, I could have two days available to go paddling and camping. The Connecticut River beckoned and I had never paddled upstream of the Chester-Hadlyme ferry.

It didn't take long to throw together the gear for a quick overnight. The tent, sleeping bag and therma-rest, stove, pot, couscous, tomatoes, oatmeal, and a change of clothing and I was off. The put-in behind the Goodspeed Opera house in East haddam was a wonderful spot to begin the adventure. The plan was to paddle downstream about four miles to Selden Neck State Park, exploring the side streams and inlets along the way. I would stay in a favorite campsite on Selden Island directly across from the town of Deep River. I would return the next afternoon, after paddling around the island in the morning and exploring more side streams.

The weather report was for sun, with strong winds out of the North on the first day and gentle south-westerlies on the second. This meant that I would have a tail wind both days to give me a boost and

make paddling easier. I should have known better than to believe the weather report.

The wind was howling out of the north as I launched, and the river was all whitecaps. As the wind whisked the kayak downstream, all I had to do was steer on this free ride. Two hardy souls were paddling upstream in a beautiful wood canoe and having a hard time of it against the wind. I was sure glad that I wouldn't have to buck the wind the next day.

The hills on either side of the Connecticut River were painted with what seemed like a hundred shades of gold and bronze. Every bend in the river revealed a stunning new vista. Even the migrating birds overhead seemed to slow down to enjoy the sight.

When I reached Lord and Rich Islands on river, I turned east into a creek to see Chapman Pond. The leaves on the hills around the pond were bursting with yellows and oranges. The pond was shallow and I ran aground as I tried to find a different stream to the main river. The tide was too low and it was all mud to this other stream. I retraced my route to the river. Hadlyme ferry, Gillette Castle,

DIRECTIONS - ESSEX TOWN HALL

Approaching from the North on Route 9, take Exit 3. At the end of the exit ramp, turn left and go under the Route 9 bridge to the light. Turn left at this light on to West Avenue. The Town Hall is about a third of a mile up the hill on the left, at the corner of West Avenue and Grove Street. Turn left onto Grove Street for parking at the rear of the building.

Approaching from the South on Route 9, take Exit 3. At the end of the exit ramp turn left and go to the light. Turn right at this light on to West Avenue. Whalebone creek, and Chester all passed in a flash and I was at Selden Island in time for an early dinner. In the evening, I heard the bells chiming across the river at Mount St. Johns School, and shortly after that, there was a beautiful sunset that rivaled the coloring of the leaves. The temperature dropped with the sun, and I snuggled down for the night, listening to the wind and hoping that it would ease up before dawn.

The next day broke with bright sunshine and NO WIND. I broke camp after breakfast and took off to circumnavigate Selden Island. Selden used to be a neck of land with the Connecticut River on one side and Selden Creek on the other. In recent history the creek broke through to the Connecticut River at the north end of the neck and turned it into an island. I turned south to paddle to the far end. I would then paddle up Selden Creek, back out the river, and north back to my car. It was easy paddling on the now glass-smooth water that reflected the colors of the hills.

I turned up the Creek and was amazed that during the War of 1812, locals managed to hide ships in this tiny stream when the British attacked the Town of Essex. It was a smoother ride up the length of the stream, but I had a surprise waiting

for me when I got back to the River. Yesterday's howling winds of the north had returned! My car was waiting four miles upstream, beyond the wind and waves. What happened to the forecast southwestlies.

Well, sitting there wasn't going to get me back to the car. Out into the river I chugged. A lot of hard paddling and several face fulls of spray managed to ferry me across the river to where I thought the wind would be a little softer. WRONG! The beautiful hills were funneling the wind straight down river. A lot more hard paddling amounted to very slow progress. The landmarks that flew by the day before seemed to stand still and mock me today. Every mile seemed longer. I was getting very tired. My hat blew off, but in no way was I going to retrieve it and lose hard won ground.

I gave serious thought to turning down river and downwind to Essex. There, I might be able to leave the boat and take a cab up to East Haddam and my car. Pride (and the fact that I only had three dollars with me) kept me going upriver.

For a short stretch, I was able to get out on shore and tow the boat behind as I walked along the river

bank, It was welcome relief to my arms and abs.

Early afternoon finally found me back at the car. Every muscle ached and I gave up on the idea of exploring more that day. Did I have a good time? You bet I did!

SMALL BOAT SHOP

As the warmer weather arrives, it's imperative that we stay ever vigilant to the perils that face us as sea kayakers. There are three major things to keep in mind:

Dress for the water temperature, not the air temperature in the springtime!!! (the warm air can create a false sense of security).

In cold water areas, don't paddle alone unless absolutely necessary. Your survival may depend on it!!!

Carry at least the minimum survival gear & food in the event of a capsized/accident/injury/unscheduled overnight stay. (This can all easily fit in a medium size dry bag in one of your hatches).

If you follow this advice and teach it to others, we will all spend our time on the water happily & without incident. Practice safe paddling!!!!
